Minutes of the Committee of Courses Meeting held on 11.07.22


A meeting of the Committee of Courses Meeting was held on 11.07.22 at 11:30 AM in the room of the Head of the Department. The following were present:

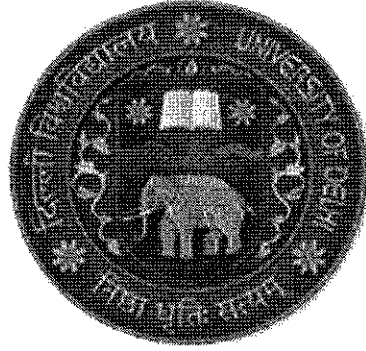

Objectives. This course provides an introduction to the nature of language and its structure. It discusses the nature of human language and its properties with reference to both nature and nurture perspectives on language.

Course learning outcomes. The learning outcomes include basic knowledge of the structure of human language, nature and properties of human language, and essential skills in analysing language structure.

Unit 4: Morphology and Syntactic structure

- Phrase structure: Words versus Phrases; relationship among words
